The Berkeley-Tulane Initiative on Vulnerable Populations conducts research in countries facing serious violations of human rights and international humanitarian law. We use empirical methods to give voice to victims of mass violence and ensure their needs and opinions are recognized by governments, U.N. agencies and nongovernmental organizations.

The Berkeley-Tulane Initiative on Vulnerable Populations is supported through grants from the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation and the Omidyar Network and The Sandler Family Supporting Foundation.

Fellowship Description

The fellow will be placed with the Trust Fund for Victims of the International Criminal Court, located in The Hague, The Netherlands for a six-month internship with a possibility of continued work for an additional six months thereafter (total of 1 year). The fellow will receive a \$10,000 stipend for living/travel expenses for the first six month period.

The goal of the fellowship is to assist the Trust Fund in developing and implementing an integrated monitoring and evaluation system to support programs and projects of Trust Fund grantees, including field research. The results of the field research will be instrumental in assisting the Trust Fund to develop and support effective and appropriate services. In particular, the fellow will work on designing research and conducting data collection related to program planning, monitoring and evaluation. The fellow will work with Trust Fund staff to:

- develop and modify monitoring and evaluation frameworks;
- incorporate community-generated monitoring and evaluation data;
- develop participatory monitoring and evaluation methodologies for local grantees;
- lead targeted program evaluation studies and assessments including developing tools and methodologies with staff and grantees;
- oversee the quality assurance and integrity of Trust Fund data and reports;

The fellow will be required to sign a confidentiality agreement with the International Criminal Court.

In summary, the fellowship involves:

- Six month fellowship, starting ideally in May or June 2008;
- Possibility of fellowship being extended for an additional 6 months (1 year in total);
- Placement with the Trust Fund for Victims of the International Criminal Court, The Hague, The Netherlands;
- Living/travel stipend of \$10,000 for six month fellowship;
- Willingness to enter into a confidentiality agreement.

Qualifications

- Training and/or experience in project monitoring and evaluation;
- Experience in developing research and design, including participatory research;
- Experience in working with grant-making institutions;
- Strong writing skills;
- An advanced degree in Public Health, Public Policy or in an equivalent program of study;
- UC Berkeley or Tulane University graduate or post-graduate student;
- French language skills desired.
